

The administrators and teachers at Rockwell ES and Wheeler ES worked on planning and implementing after-school programs. Again this year, we are fortunate to have offered several after-school programs for academics in Math, Reading, and ELA along with Social & Emotional Learning opportunities that are centered on student activities in the fine arts, athletics, and physical education. Mr. Dodge and the Transportation Dept. did a fine job organizing the late bus runs for the Jr/Sr High School, Rockwell, and Wheeler ES.

Congratulations to all the Winter Athletes and Extra Curricular participants for completing another successful season! OCS hosted extracurricular and athletic activities including two robotic tournaments - a middle school tournament and a high school tournament and a girls' varsity basketball tournament. OCS also hosted the OHSL Wrestling Championship Tournament and a girls varsity basketball tournament. OCS also nosted the OHSL Wrestling Championship Tournament with strong support from parents, modified, and youth wrestlers helping to run the tournament. The combined Marcellus/OCS wrestling team came away with their second straight OHSL League Tournament Championship. Rapping up their season, the Girls' Varsity Basketball Team advanced to the sectional quarterfinals and then fell to Cooperstown. The boys' varsity basketball team held their own this season. However, they came up short in their first-round sectional game. The combined boys' varsity hockey (Bishop Ludden, Lafayette, Marcellus, Onondaga, Solvay, Syracuse, and Westhill school districts) team made their bid in the sectional tournament getting eliminated in the semifinal game against West Genésee.

We are looking forward to the Drama Club's presentation of the "High School Musical"! The staff, crew, and cast have been hard at work preparing for the show with long rehearsals, set design, and building. We hope to see you at the show with performances happening on March 17 & 18 at 7:00 pm or Sunday, March 19 at 2:00

2023-2024 Budget Development Status

We have been full steam ahead in our budget process this winter. We are expecting the final State Budget by April 1, 2023. We are hoping that the State Budget remains favorable to taxpayers as well as that winter will be long gone by the time we have a finalized State Budget. The Governor is proposing a total of \$34.5 billion in state support for schools compared to the approved 2022-23 budget of \$31.5 billion. This represents a fully funded Foundation Aid year-to-year increase of \$2.7 billion (an estimated 7.4%) relative to the Campaign for Fiscal Equity. An additional increase is proposed of \$250 million to Foundation for high-impact tutoring with guidelines for districts that received a 3% or more increase in the Foundation Aid. The total increase represents a \$1.6 billion (8.1%) increase in formula aids. Rounding out the Governor's proposal is fully funding expensed-based aid, i.e. transportation, district special education programs, textbooks, and technical aid. based aid, i.e. transportation, district special education programs, textbooks, and technical aid.

We are still finalizing our budget numbers using the Governor's Executive Budget proposal that was released in January. Our priorities this year will be consistently focusing on remaining fiscally stable and offering the best programs we can with the resources we have. These include:

• Maintaining current programs and positions- We have a few retirements this year and I want to thank

- o A second School Psychologist- providing two school for the district. Student needs and supports are driving these enrollment trends requiring increased manpower for services to
- support diverse cognitive, social, and emotional learners.
 o A third School Resource Officer SRO- affording each building to have a full-time SRO, for security, education, consulting, and training.

o Expanding our Art Program with the addition of a .5 Art teacher will make the part-time position full-time. This will also help grow the art program with ceramic and material for 3D art offerings.

 o Proposal for replacing our aging plow truck and our annual bus purchase. This year we proposed to replace three buses, and the fourth bus that was originally planned for this past year, but manufacturing shutdowns canceled the build.
 Professional Development- Prek-5 Mathematics Program and Curriculum evaluation and selection, LETRS Two Reading Instruction is built into the budget and also supported with ARPA Funding: LETRS training helps us strengthen a strong group of teachers' reading instruction skills with the science of learning to read that is partnered nicely with Wonders and Open Court ELA program.

Factoring in the Property Tax Cap

We will not finalize our budget until NYS Aid Numbers are finalized in Albany by April 1, 2023 The Executive Budget proposes Onondaga CSD will receive a 6.85% or \$664,828 increase in foundation aid in 2023-24. More details can be found on the OCS website at https://go.boarddocs.com/ny/ocs/Board.nsf/ Public and also on the Governor's website at https://www.budget.ny.gov/pubs/archive/fy23/ex/index.html.

In the proposed Executive Budget, Governor Hochul has proposed a tax cut package that will reduce overall taxes by approximately \$3 billion over the next three years. This includes an expansion of the existing property tax credit program and an increase in the earned income tax credit, as well as raising the minimum wage to \$15 per hour. Additionally, she is creating a new Homeowner Tax Rebate Credit for eligible low to middle-income households, senior households and STAR exemption/credit beneficiaries with incomes below \$250,000. This rebate can provide relief up to a percentage of their current STAR benefit amount.

Please do not hesitate to reach out for information or questions in the coming weeks as we prepare the budget for the 2023-2024 school year. Thank you for all your support of our students and programs at Onondaga Central, without you we could not do it!

BOARD OF EDUCATION ELECTION

Two seats (3-year terms each) will be open on the Board of Education. Interested candidates for one of these seats on the board of Education must obtain a petition at the District Office between the hours of 8:00am and 4:00pm, Monday through Friday at 4466 South Onondaga Road, Nedrow. Petitions must be signed by at least twenty-five (25) qualified voters of the District. Petitions must be returned by the end of business on April 17, 2023, by 5:00pm to be included on the voting booth ballot.

Qualifications for candidates for the Board of Election are:

- -Must be 18 years of age
- -Must be able to read and write
- -Must be a resident of the District for the year immediately prior to the date of the board election (May 16, 2023)
- -Not more than one member of a family residing at the same address shall be a member of the same board of education in any school district
- -Cannot be an employee of Onondaga Central School District



NURSES CORNER

Strategies to Help Parents and Families Create Healthy and Supportive School Environments

The relationship between school staff and families can reinforce student health and learning across multiple settings—at home, in school, in out-of-school programs, and in the community.

Parents and families have a powerful role in supporting children's learning, health, and well-being at home and at school. When parents are engaged in their children's school activities and initiatives, children get better grades, choose healthier behaviors, and have better social skills. Students who have parents involved in their school lives also are more likely to avoid unhealthy behaviors and they are less likely to be emotionally distressed.

Positive relationships and coping skills learned at home and at school help children and adolescents develop the skills to:

- -recognize and manage emotions
- -set and achieve positive goals
- -appreciate the perspectives of others
- -establish and maintain positive relationships
- -make responsible decisions

Reach out to your child's teachers, counselors or administrators to find out how we can work together to help them become the best they can be.

School/sports physicals are offered twice each year to students: once each fall and then again in the spring. School physicals will be offered on Wednesday, **May 17, 2023**; they will not be offered again until October, 2023. School physicals are free of charge for all students. You may contact your school nurse if you would like to schedule your child for a school physical in May. Physicals are required for all students entering grades Pre-K or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 in the fall, all students wishing to participate in the sports program as well as for students needing working papers.

Note: It is recommended that these examinations be done by the family physician if possible, as he/she is most familiar with your child. Your family physician is better able to judge any change or problem in your child's state of health, and can discuss any recommendations with you directly at that time. They can also update your child's immunizations and complete medication forms if medications are required in school (includes inhalers).


