ONONDAGA CENTRAL SCHOOL BUDGET EDITION

Dear Stakeholders:

On May 16, 2023, Onondaga Central School District residents will have an opportunity to vote on a \$25,810,709 proposed budget for the 2023-2024 school year. We take pride that the Onondaga Central School Community can meet challenges so students can reach their maximum potential and be prepared to be contributing citizens.

This coming school year's budget is an increase of 3.72% (\$926,454) over the 2022-23 school year. Of the \$926,454 increase, \$209,862 will be covered by the proposaed levy increase. The difference, \$716,592 will be covered by other sources including New York State Aid. The majority of the general fund budget increase is due to the addition of one School Resource Officer (2 to 3 SROs - one for each building), an additional school psychologist, an increase of the Jr/Sr High School Art position from .5 to full-time and adding a part-time athletic trainer. These specific additions will help us address school safety and academic, social, and emotional health needs. As well, this budget supports maintaining programs and small class sizes. The proposed budget will carry a 1.975% overall tax levy increase. The proposed budget supports the resources to maintain our educational programs, safety protocols, increased contractual obligations, and health insurance expenses. Under the NYS Tax cap law, the district has a levy threshold limit of 1.975%. The proposed tax levy increase of 1.975% has an estimated increase for the cost to landowners of the Town of Onondaga of 44 cents per \$1000 of assessed value.

The two major goals of Onondaga's annual budget are to balance the need to maintain all programs and staffing, as well as continue to keep our 10 year average tax rate increase to a minimum. Over the past ten years, district residents have averaged an annual tax increase of approximately .82%. The 2023-2024 budget priorities continue to include:

- -School Safety & Security
- -Commitment to Small Class Size
- -ELL/ENL Staffing Support
- -Special Education & Alternative Education Programs -Annual School Bus Replacements
- -Academic Intervention Services (AIS)
- -Maintain all Current Educational Programs

- -Maintain Facilities
- -Annual Computer Replacement Plan
- -Ability to Handle Fiscal Challenges
- -Account for Federal/State Mandates

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

The chart is a summary of our actual 2010-2011 through 2022-2023 school budget information and the proposed 2023-2024 school budget data. In August, we will receive the updated property assessment figures from the four towns located in our district. As evidenced by the chart, you can see there were many years with a zero percent increase in the tax rate. Over the past 14 years, the tax rate has averaged an annual increase of .65%.

The 2023-2024 General Fund budget does not encompass the additional Federal funding that districts have received in the form of the 2021 ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act). OCS' ARPA allocation totals approximately \$2 million. It must be spent over the course of three years and will sunset during the 2023-2024 school year. There are multiple specific restrictions and parameters for which the money must be utilized, including programs focused

on learning loss and additional enrichment activities to address pandemic-related educational deficits. The ARPA funding is expense-based, in that OCS must spend the money on ARPA-approved programs to supplement our students' education and will receive reimbursement in the future. It is important to note these grant funds cannot be accounted for in the general, annual budget.

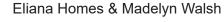

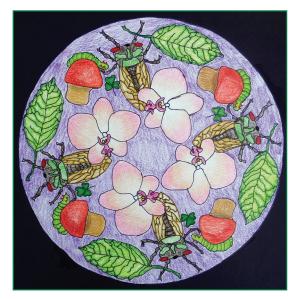

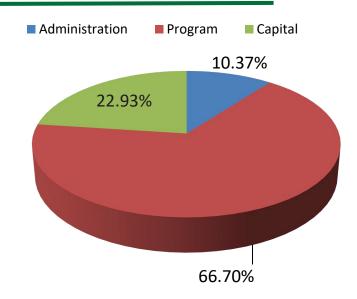

Administrative Costs include the salaries and benefits of all certified staff who spend 50% or more of their time in administration, plus the salaries and benefits of clerical staff. Also, school board costs, curriculum development, tax collection, legal and auditing costs, central printing, central data processing and BOCES administrative costs.

Program Costs include the salaries and benefits of all teachers and staff delivering pupil services (health, guidance, library, and athletics). Also, textbooks, instructional materials, equipment, extracurricular student activities, BOCES program costs, and all costs of the transportation program except bus purchases.

Capital Costs include the salaries and benefits of maintenance and custodial staff, plus debt service, utilities, and general insurance.



Contingent Budgets If residents vote down the proposed budget, the Board of Education

has two options:

- 1. Resubmit the same budget or a revised budget for a revote on June 20, 2023.
- 2. Adopt a contingent budget, which state law now dictates cannot exceed the current year's tax levy. (If residents vote down a re- submitted budget, the district MUST adopt a contingent budget.)

What's a contingent budget? Unlike in years past, the new statute requires contingent budgets to carry a ZERO percent increase over the current year's levy. In other words, the district would have to levy the same amount of taxes as in the current year or less – without any adjustment for state pension rate increases, con-tractual obligations or any other costs, mandated or not. It also means all "non-contingent expenses" would have to be cut from the budget. These include field trips for social or entertainment purposes, new equipment, non-essential maintenance spending and some student supplies.

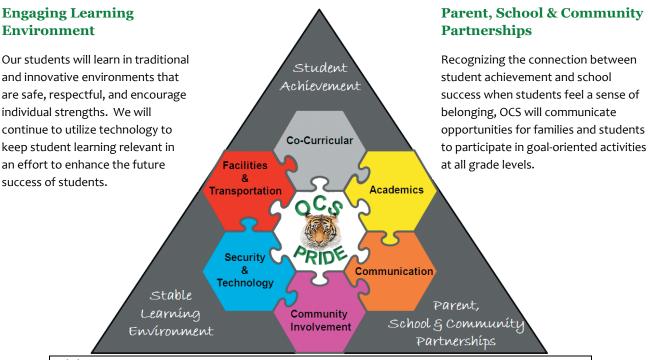

Proposition 1 (Budget)

Shall the proposed budget of the Onondaga Central School District as recommended by the Board of Education for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023, be adopted and shall the Board of Education be authorized to levy the necessary taxes therefore?

Proposition II (Student Transport Vehicles)

Shall the Board of Education of the Onondaga Central School District be authorized to purchase and finance two (2) 66-passenger school buses, one (1) 24-passenger school bus and one (1) 30-passenger school bus, including necessary furnishings, fixtures and equipment and all other costs incidental thereto, and expend a total sum not to exceed \$434,300, which is estimated to be the total maximum cost thereof, and said amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax upon the taxable property of said School District and collected in annual installments as provided by Section 416 of the Education Law; and, in anticipation of such tax, obligations of said School District, in the principal amount not to exceed \$434,300, shall be issued.

Proposition III (Library)

Shall the Onondaga Central School District levy and collect a tax, pursuant to Section 259 of the Education Law of the State of New York, in the sum of \$60,100 (which is an increase of \$1,750 from the levy in effect from 2022-2023 in the sum of \$58,350) for the continuing support and maintenance of the free library services offered to district residents by the Onondaga Free Library historically supported by the Onondaga Central School District?
