LETTER FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

A SEASON OF PRIDE AND CELEBRATION

As winter settled in earlier than expected, I want to take a moment to reflect on the many successes and memorable experiences our students and staff have shared this fall and early winter. We are happy to celebrate the success of students in the fall season with this newsletter edition. The transition into the winter months brings new opportunities to celebrate learning, creativity, and school spirit across our district.

We are already experiencing winter weather conditions, including delays and emergency closures (snow days). Central New York winters, particularly lake-effect weather, can be unpredictable, as we have already seen this season. When weather forecasts are uncertain, the district is prepared. All large school buses are equipped with on-the-spot tire chains that deploy beneath the rear tires to provide improved traction on snowy and icy roads. In addition, smaller buses are equipped with studded snow tires on the rear wheels to enhance stability in winter conditions. The district remains fully committed to the safety of our students, staff, and equipment. These measures are among the many investments we have made to enhance safety during winter weather, which can be unpredictable even for meteorologists. OCS Celebrates Newest National Honor Society Members

The Onondaga Central School District Chapters of National Honor Society (NHS) and National Junior Honor Society (NJHS) were established to recognize outstanding high school students. Student eligibility is based on record of

scholarship, leadership, character, and service at Onondaga Central School District and the communities served by the school district.

Students who demonstrate scholarship with an overall GPA of 92% or higher for 12 consecutive marking periods (2 years) are invited as candidates to join NHS and NJHS. Each member must complete 18 hours of service over the course of 12 months to maintain their membership status in NHS and NJHS.

SPANISH STUDENTS VISIT SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY FOR IMMERSIVE EXPERIENCE

NURSES CORNER

Keeping Our School Healthy During the Winter Season

As we head into the busy holiday month, we want to share a few important reminders to help keep all students and staff healthy, safe, and learning their best.

Stay Home When Sick

Winter brings an increase in colds, flu, and other illnesses. Please keep your child home if they show any of the following:

- » Fever of 100°F (37.8°C) or higher
- » Vomiting or diarrhea
- » A persistent cough or difficulty breathing
- » A new rash or unexplained symptoms
- » Eyes that are red, painful, or producing discharge

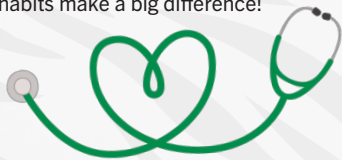
Students should remain home until symptom-free for 24 hours without medication.

No Sharing of Personal Items

To reduce the spread of germs:

- » Avoid sharing water bottles, hats, brushes, combs, earbuds, lip balm, and personal clothing
- » Remind children to wash their hands often and use hand sanitizer when needed.

These small habits make a big difference!



Head Lice Reminders

Head lice can happen to anyone and is more common during the winter when children wear hats and share warm accessories. Please check your child's hair weekly.

Signs include:

- » Itching or scratching of the scalp
- » Nits (small white or tan eggs) attached near the root of the hair
- » Live lice on the scalp or hair

If lice are found, please notify the school nurse so we can support you with treatment guidance and ensure a safe return to school.

Winter Weather Preparedness

Cold weather is here! Make sure your child comes to school dressed appropriately for outdoor play and travel:

- » Warm coat
- » Boots
- » Hats, gloves, and scarves
- » Extra socks and clothes

In case of inclement weather, please monitor district alerts for schedule updates or closures.

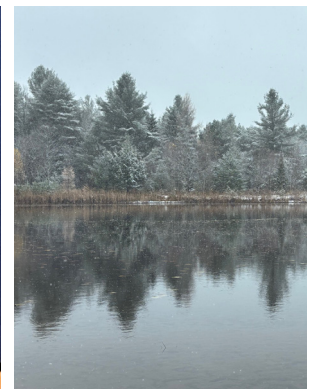

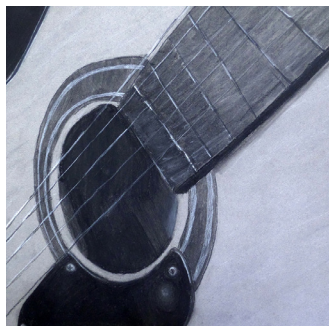
The Memory Project
