LETTER FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

2026-2027 BUDGET DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

The Governor's Executive Budget proposal, released in January 2026, includes a \$779 million increase to Foundation Aid across New York State, representing a 2.96% boost overall. For the Onondaga Central School District, this translates to a proposed increase of \$73,952, or 1.00%, the minimum "save harmless" floor provided in this year's state formula. This is a sharp contrast to the more robust increase seen last year of \$769,269, or 11.61%.

While any increase is helpful, the district continues to face the dual challenge of cooling state aid and sharply rising operational costs, particularly in health insurance and energy services. To maintain our standards, we have had to rely on fund balance and reserves to bridge recent gaps. Despite these financial pressures, we remain committed to preserving the quality of education our students deserve. We are currently finalizing the 2026-2027 budget, which will be presented to the Board of Education for approval this April.

As we plan for the upcoming school year, we are excited to announce the nearing completion of the 2026 Capital Project. This initiative, focused on enhancing our learning environments and infrastructure, is a testament to our long-term vision for the district. Our focus remains on making strategic, thoughtful decisions that balance fiscal responsibility with maintaining the educational experiences that benefit all students.

Because state and federal funding directions remain uncertain, our priority this year is to reduce the use of fund balance and reserves, while minimizing the ask to taxpayers. We will achieve this through strategic reductions and efficiency measures, ensuring a sustainable path forward without compromising our core mission.

Stay tuned for more updates as we continue to shape a budget that reflects our commitment to excellence in education.

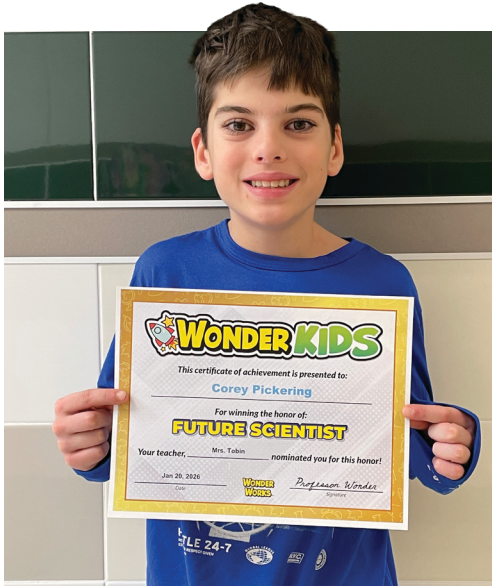


OCS Alumna Kaitlyn Guptill Honored by New York State Bar Association

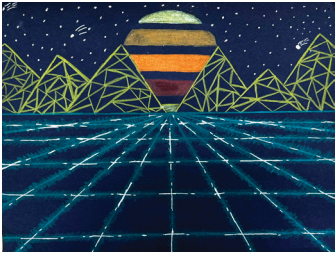

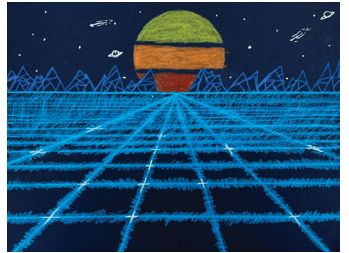

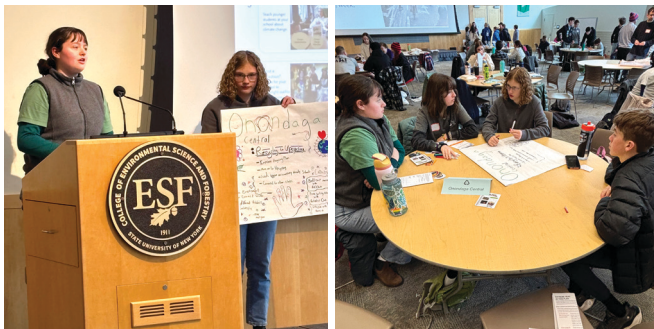
Here are a few simple tips to help make mornings easier:

BOYS BASKETBALL

The team put together a strong and competitive 2025–2026 season, finishing with an impressive 14–8 overall record and one of the best starts in years. Balance on both ends of the floor allowed the group to win close games while also pulling away in several decisive victories. Some highlights of the season included Howard Wright becoming the fourth all-time leading scorer for OCS Boys' Basketball and also earning Player of the Year for the OHSL Patriot American Division. Sean Miller tied the school record for most 3 pointers made in one game with 7 made. Bryce Mattison and Jakari Hill earned 2nd Team honors for our Division and James Bouyea earned Honorable Mention. In Sectionals, we defeated a very tough Hamilton team in the first round and, unfortunately, fell to the number one team in the state, Cooperstown, in the Quarterfinals. We are looking to regroup and further develop this off-season with open gyms, weight room, and summer league opportunities.

GIRLS BASKETBALL

The Girls' Basketball Team finished the season with a 14-7 record. The team was led by Senior and Co-Captain Sydney Cox, who, this year, became the seventh 1000-point scorer in Girls' Basketball History at OCS. This year's team consisted of Senior - Sydney Cox, Juniors - Zanai Wright, Amani Donze, and Kendal Marsh, Sophomore - Macie Barbuto, Freshman - Madison Ryan, 8th Grade - Sophie Cox, and 7th Grade - Lilly Pulver. The future is bright for the Girls' Basketball Program!

WRESTLING

The Wrestling Program concluded its season with many achievements. One of the amazing achievements was a dominant dual-meet run at Indian River High School, where Marcellus–Onondaga defeated Adirondack 71–6 in the quarterfinals, South Jefferson 56–17 in the semifinals, and defending champion Sherburne-Earlville 55–24 in the final, securing a landmark, first-ever Section 3 Division 2 Dual Meet Title.

The Marcellus-Onondaga wrestling program also made history by capturing its first-ever Section 3 Division 2 Team Championship. A full recap of the historic event is on the next page.

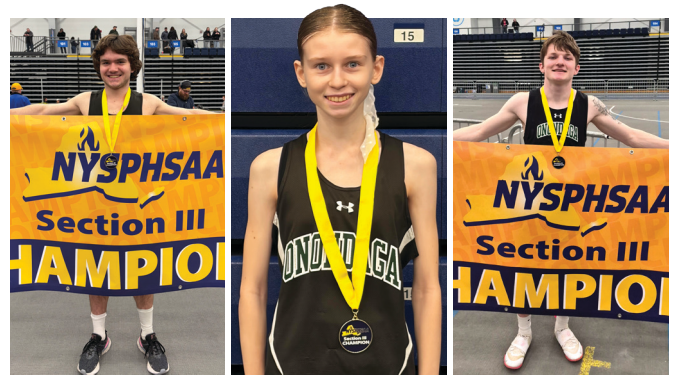
ICE HOCKEY

WINTER TRACK

The Boys and Girls Varsity Team competed in a half-dozen crossover track meets at Onondaga Community College. They continued their improvement as the season progressed and had great success in the league and class championships.

In the League Championship, the following athletes won their events and earned 1st-team all-league status: Reed Luton (3200m), Ben Nett (Pole Vault), and the boys' 4x800 consisting of Reed Luton, Devon Munnell, James Gemmell, and Sam Szczesny.

The Winter Track teams concluded their season at classes, placing 3rd (boys) and 4th (girls) out of 15 teams. Three sectional champions from OCS were crowned: Reed Luton (3200m), Ben Nett (Pole Vault), and Molly Humphrey (3000m).





Marcellus-Onondaga Wrestling Claims Historic First Section 3 Division 2 Team Championship

The Marcellus-Onondaga wrestling program reached a historic milestone, capturing its first-ever Section 3 Division 2 Team Championship.

“This title is a testament to the ‘every man’ philosophy we’ve preached all season,” said the coaching staff. “We didn’t just rely on one or two stars; we had nine different wrestlers climb the podium. When you have guys fighting through the consolation brackets to take 4th and 5th place, those are the points that win team trophies.”

Jake Burton (126 lbs) also reached the championship finals, earning a hard-fought silver medal. The Mustangs’

scoring was further bolstered by a sea of “bonus points” from pins and technical falls across the lineup. Standout performances included Travis Stack (215 lbs), who contributed four pins to the team total, and Knoll McCoy (118 lbs) and Connor Fraher (175 lbs), who both battled back from early losses to secure 5th-place finishes.
