## Kindness Is Beautiful





## The Tree-Plenish Program

This March, Mr. Mauro's Environmental Club participated in a tree planting program called Tree-Plenish. The goal of the program is to offset



the paper use in the Jr/Sr High by planting saplings. Students calculated that approximately 1.2 million sheets of paper are used each year at the school and that it would take 120 trees to offset the loss of trees to make that much paper. Students and community members purchased 217 saplings to plant this spring crushing the original goal. On April 23rd, students will distribute the saplings and students will also go out to the community and plant some for certain community members that requested that. Students have learned how important trees are to our environment and how important it is to help be a positive force in our community to fight climate change and the loss of trees.

## Maple Sugaring Event

On Saturday, March 26th, with a few snowflakes in the air, seven students from Mr. Mauro's Environmental Club and Mrs. Kurucz attended a Maple Sugaring Event hosted by SUNY ESF and the Master Teacher Youth Climate Summit. Along with about 40 other students from around the county they went to Heiberg Forest in Tully to learn about SUNY ESF's maple sugaring process. They learned the process from tapping trees to how the science of an evaporator transforms sap into syrup. Students also attended several workshops hosted by SUNY ESF students and staff on the importance of forest conservation, the effects of climate change on maple trees and the importance of soils in our world. At the end of the day, students came home with a pint of maple syrup produced that day and a handful of wonderful experiences.

The Forensic Science class had Officer Smolen come in to field questions about police work. Students asked excellent questions about crime scenes, required schooling to become a police officer, forensic procedures, personal experiences including favorite and least favorite aspects of the job, and how policing has changed over Officer Smolen's time. School physicals will be offered on Wednesday, May 11, 2022; they will not be offered again until October, 2022. School physicals are free of charge. You may contact Ms. Rohe if you would like to schedule your child for a school physical in May. Physicals are required for all students entering grades 7, 9 and 11 in the fall, and all students wishing to participate in the sports program or students needing working papers.

**Note:** It is recommended that these examinations be done by the family physician if possible, as he/she is most familiar with your child. Your family physician is better able to judge any change or problem in your child's state of health, and can discuss any recommendations with you directly at that time. They can also update your child's immunizations and complete medication forms if medications are required in school (includes inhalers).


including exterior exit and entrance to gain easy access to the existing garden and patio outdoor seating area and finishing a final upgrade to classroom bathroom. At Rockwell ES we will be finishing up the classroom renovations in the two Pre-kindergarten classrooms with bathroom and cabinetry upgrades and in the corridors walls and ceiling upgrades. We are very appreciative and thankful for community support to help us maintain and make improvements to facilities and grounds. This summer's work will conclude a three to four year process of planning, designing and construction to preserve our facilities for the next several generations.

We are busy working on the OCS 2022-2023 budget as you will see in the coming news and budget publications. We have an expected budget to budget increase of 1.80% to the general budget. Additionally, we are expecting a 5.51% increase due to the previously approved 2020 Capital Project coming "on the books" this upcoming year. As we shared when planning in 2019 and 2020 for the Capital Project and voting back in March of 2020, the project would have little impact on the tax rate as there is proportional Building Aid associated with this increase to offset the project's debt payments. You will be receiving more information soon on the proposed Budget for 2022-2023, as we have developed the budget and have been able to maneuver around some of the highest inflation rates we have seen in years, creating impact across the

board to all aspects running the school. One of our major goals in this year's budget development was to maintain all programs and staffing, which the proposed budget accomplished. Another goal was also to keep our 10 year average tax rate increase low and we aimed at that again with an estimated rate of .53% average increase for ten years. We are very thankful to the community for your support and dedication to our School District. Without you, all the great programs we offer and updated facilities cannot happen.

This year, we settled into a more normal feeling of school that once was the unconscious comfortable way of life prior to the pandemic. We thank all of you for the ability to adapt to the changes during the school year. I would like to say it again, I am very proud and grateful with the display of teamwork, cooperation, and caring from stakeholders in Onondaga CSD! As you have seen from many of my previous communications, the health and safety of our students, staff and community is our top priority and will continue to be. We will also continue to be good stewards of the school and keep a respectful eye on what is asked of the community financially too. The final months of the school year are here. If you have time, come out and catch a game, meet, musical concert or an awards ceremony. Our students are doing great things in and out of the classroom. **Go Tigers! Be stubbornly POSITIVE AND CONSISTENTLY STRONG!**




